Scuttlebutt \SKUHT-I-buht\, noun:

Scuttlebutt in nautical terminology is a water fountain or water cask on a ship.

Water for immediate consumption on a sailing ship was conventionally stored in a scuttled butt: a butt (cask or small barrel) which had been scuttled by making a hole in it so the water could be withdrawn. Since Sailors exchanged gossip when they gathered at the scuttlebutt for a drink of water, scuttlebutt became slang for gossip or rumors.

The modern equivalent is the office water cooler, also a source of refreshment and gossip.

VLAMING HEAD LIGHTHOUSE - By Max Fitton

It seems that lighthouses all occupy some of the best views available. Vlaming Head Lighthouse is no exception. It is situated in a dominating position on the tallest hill before reaching the divide of the Cape Range National Park, near Exmouth.

The Vlaming lighthouse ceased operation in 1967, but it's light stills shines brightly but from a VLF (Very Low Frequency) pylon in the Naval Communications base at Pt Murat on the North West Cape.

In 1907 the SS Mildurah was carrying a cargo of cattle from the Cambridge Gulf to Fremantle when it cut the corner of the North West Cape and sank very close to shore No human lives were lost but no **cattle survived. Seven crew members set out for Onslow in a ship's boat and were rescued by the SS** Burrumbeet. At a subsequent Commission of Enquiry hearing it was decided to add the need for a lighthouse to be built at Vlaming Head (in addition *nter alia* to the lighthouse at Cape Leveque). It took some time because of the lack of port facilities close by and it was not completed until 1912.

The light first came into operation on 10 December of that year.

The official story is that there was a cyclone brewing and as a result the ship struck a reef. Believe what you will.

The tower is about 20m high and about 5m in diameter at the base. The walls are made of cement

and stones and rendered inside and out. The lantern was built in Birmingham UK and was fuelled by kerosene. On a clear night it was visible about 35 Km.







The starkness of the tower can be seen from the close up:



In the same location is an old radar tower:

This was developed during the Second World War to service the needs of the US Navy and the RAAF. In 1953 it was largely destroyed by a cyclone as were the lighthouse keepers' cottages. The keepers restored their cottages but the radar tower deteriorated to such an extent that a replica was constructed and installed in February 2001.

Apart from things nautical the Cape Range National Park is a delightful area and for those who venture over to the west is well worth the visit.

A Fisherman's Memorial - Port Denison WA- By Max Fitton

Port Denison is a small fishing port supporting the livelihood of Cray fishermen. It is situated about 70 Km South of Geraldton and 370 Km north of Perth.

It has a well protected harbour and contains a fishing co-op, that unlike similar operations on the east coast does not sell to the public – that is the Australian public. Overseas countries are virtually the sole recipients of this catch.



I always thought that ships' captains never took shortcuts but for the second time this trip a vessel, the brigantine Leander did so. Under the command of captain R Johnston the ship left Fremantle on 11 November 1853, bound for Singapore via Champion Bay and turned too early for its run into Geraldton Harbour and struck the Leander reef.

The obelisk was built in 1869 as an aid to navigation.

Travel is wonderful as there is always something new to learn wherever one goes.

First working meeting

The first working meeting of the WA Chapter was held at my workshop on 24 June 2015 at 11 am. Present were L to R Prospective member - Harold Burton, John Rice, Jeff Zecchin and me.



As can be seen from the photo we were all nicely relaxed just about to participate in a sausage sizzle.

I reported on the inaugural meeting when the Chapter got off the ground. This current meeting was the first of what we hope will be the forerunner of many more technical and social meetings to come.

Initially it was agreed that Douglas Gordon would lead a discussion on the building of ships rails but sadly Douglas had to pull out and I substituted for him and talked about hull and deck planking and gave a demonstration of how to do the necessary measurements using the plank width plotting board. I also gave out a copy of the board, taken, of course, from the excellent details in the Workshop Notes. I have recently been in touch with George Crossan during which time we discussed the way he does his planking. Fortunately he sent me a disk showing his method so I used the data for leading the discussion crediting him with the method.

This was followed by a discussion of how to do the deck planking including a demonstration of how to used thread (from Spotlight) for caulking. I showed the 'four interval' method starting from the centre line of the deck and joggling some of the planks into the margin plank.

During these discussions a question was raised about bending the hull planks to shape for fitting to a vessel with a bluff bow. I have an electric tool, similar to a soldering iron that I first saw demonstrated by Michael Pearson at a regular monthly meeting in Canberra some years ago now.

At about 1 pm we adjourned as Judges might say *sine dei* for a sausage sizzle. The date of the next meeting cannot yet be determined because Harold has to undergo some major back surgery and John also has some minor surgery, both within the next month or so. When a suitable date has been decided John will lead a discussion on the building of a 'bread and butter ' hull.

In principal, the practicalities for the Chapter were reiterated – we would accept one more member, which would allow us each to give one talk per annum and have one social outing to celebrate Xmas or some other suitable occasion.

John and I are both looking forward to catching up with you all at Expo2015.

Miss Fishers Murders - by Ray Osmotherly

This is a little bit of interest provided by Ray if you missed the email.

"On Friday night (19 June 2015) if you were watching "Miss Fisher's Murders" on ABC TV you would have seen a beautiful steam launch in one of the scenes. In case you didn't recognize it or missed the name on the launch, it was the S.L." ENA".

At one of our meetings some time ago Joe Allen spoke about the "ENA" and its colourful history. It was a pleasant surprise to see this wonderful boat featured in this episode of the popular Miss Fisher's Murders series.

The ENA was built in 1900 at Berry's Bay, Sydney for Thomas Dibbs one of Australia's richest men, at a cost of £5800 pounds.

She was part of the social life of the wealthy, high society set of Sydney. She has had various names since launching : "ENA", HMAS "Sleuth" & "Aurore"

During World War I she was purchased by The Royal Australian Navy for 1000 pounds and commissioned in 1917 as HMAS "Sleuth" and used as an auxiliary patrol vessel around the Torres Strait and Thursday Island during the first World War.

Later she was used as a training ship tender in Sydney.

In 1933 she was sold by the RAN for £1350 pounds and was used by the new owner to transport apples from Tasmania to the mainland. Shortly after, she was impounded by creditors and laid up.

In 1940 she was sold to the Roche brothers and renamed "Aurore" and used for trawling and scallop fishing.

The steam engine was replaced by a diesel engine in 1945 She was sold again in 1974.

In 1981 "Aurore" sank in the D'Entrecasteaux Channel after hitting an unidentified object. The vessel was raised by businessman Pat Burke and stockbroker Rene Rivkin and restored to her former glory and the diesel engine replaced by an 80 horsepower steam engine. She resumed operation in 1986 under her original name of "ENA".

During 1987 and 1988 she circumnavigated Australia and was in W.A. for the 1987 Americas Cup

She returned to Sydney for private charter cruises but was again seized by creditors.

She was sold to new owners in 1991 and relocated to Melbourne and sold once more in May 2015.

Funny Trivia About Brass Monkey

Back before missiles, it was necessary to keep a good supply of cannon balls near the cannon on war ships.

But how to prevent them from rolling about the deck was the problem. The best storage method devised was to stack them as a square based pyramid, with one ball on top, resting on four, resting on nine, which rested on sixteen. Thus, a supply of 30 cannon balls could be stacked in a small area right next to the cannon.

There was only one problem, how to prevent the bottom layer from sliding/rolling from under the others. The solution was a metal plate with 16 round indentations, called a Monkey. But if this plate was made of iron, the iron balls would quickly rust to it. The solution to the rusting problem was to make Brass Monkeys.

Few landlubbers realize that brass contracts much more and much faster than iron when chilled.

Consequently, when the temperature dropped too far, the brass indentations would shrink so much that the iron cannon balls would come right off the monkey.

Thus, it was quite literally, cold enough to freeze the balls off a brass monkey.

And all this time, you thought that was a vulgar expression, didn't you?
